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# Grants and Improvements

By now a large number of you have likely had the opportunity to visit the newly renovated Community Centre in Stonecliffe and have observed first hand the improvements made to our Hall. For those of you who have not had the opportunity... 2010 brought funding from both the federal and provincial governments to stimulate the economy. As we do not have a lot of municipal infrastructure our applications focused on improving efficiency and accessibility in our Municipal Hall, Library, Office building and garage.

**For 2010, special grants amounted to over \$181,000: \$30,000 for lighting and insulation for the hall & garage; \$54,000 to accessibility modifications, which will result in new washrooms & automatic doors; \$40,000 towards a pavilion and play equipment for Old Mackey park; \$17,000 to water system upgrades & well repairs from the Gas Tax Funding and \$40,000 towards garage upgrades to doors & heating system.**

The Infrastructure Stimulus Fund provided 2/3 funding (1/3 each from federal and provincial governments) towards increased insulation and improved lighting in the hall; as well as new doors, lights and heating system in the garage.

The government of Canada providing funding through HRSDC's Enabling Accessibility Fund to pay for new automatic doors in the office, library, hall and washrooms; and to fully pay for remodeling of the washrooms to allow for improved accessibility.

**Thank you to the Federal and Provincial governments who under "Canada's Economic Action Plan" and "Ontario's Creating Jobs. Building Ontario." Infrastructure program, HRSDC's "Enabling Accessibility Fund" and the Trillium Foundation have funded important infrastructure projects throughout our municipality.**

These are just some of the examples of your tax dollars working in your community, and of our staff and Council successfully applying for special programs. If you haven't yet, come out and see the difference.

In addition to upgrades to our buildings, Old Mackey Park has been given some attention as well; this time with thanks to the Trillium Foundation. In 2010 a pavilion was erected to provide shelter for park users. We have also installed play equipment including swings, and climbing apparatus geared to children from 5—12 years of age.

We are still looking for additional funding/volunteer hours to purchase picnic tables and complete some landscaping. If you have any fundraising ideas or are willing to donate some perennials, please contact any staff member.

## Monthly Health Check & Wellness Clinics

The second Wednesday of each month the North Renfrew Long Term Care visits our community centre and provides companionship, entertainment and lunch for our seniors (cost of lunch is \$5.50).

As a quick guide, the following activities may require a permit—please call **before you begin**.

- New building;
- Garage, porch, deck, addition;
- Rooms in basement or attic;
- Enclosing a porch or deck;
- Raising or excavating to add a basement;
- Structure larger than 100 ft<sup>2</sup>;
- Fireplace or central air;
- Siding, roofing, re-shingling;
- Drywall, vapour barrier, insulation;
- Replacement of doors or windows;
- Demolition; Septic systems.



Otherwise you may have to redo or undo work already completed—and at your own expense.

## CHECK OUT YOUR PUBLIC LIBRARY

Many changes have occurred these past few months at the Public Library. Renovations are complete providing much needed storage and accessible work centres for all. The library's circulation is now automated through a program called "JASI". This project was made available through the support of SOLS – Southern Ontario Library Services and OLS-N, Ontario Library Services-North as well as from past grant monies budgeted to improve the library for our patrons, volunteers and staff.

One of our newest programs is "Tumble Books" a dynamic reading program for kids. It is something you can take advantage of at our library or in your home. You will find: TumbleReadables, Tumble Talking Books and Tumble Book Library. This online collection provides options such as read along, audio and/or animated features to our younger generation.

Our collection is very diversified and current, with reading material that will meet the interests of most everybody in the townships.

The library also has a laptop lending program (special commitments of liability apply) to assist our patrons when away from home.

Our Public Library is a CAP site (Community Access Program) and offers 3 computer stations for public use, each fully accessible. We also have WI-FI for those who have after hour needs or wish to bring in their own laptops to access mail etc.

For your convenience our library is open daily from 8:30 to 4:00 through the Township offices, as well as Tuesday evenings from 6:00 – 8:30 and Saturday afternoons 12:30 to 3:00.

## FIRE SAFETY & PREVENTION

The best way to avoid fires and fire loss is through education and prevention. Most of this is common sense however countless fires are caused every year because of these practises.

Do not use extension cords that are frayed or damaged, have loose prongs or heat excessively when in use and avoid running them under carpets or heavy furniture! Do not run appliances with large demand on extension cords and avoid overloading outlets!



### WATCH YOUR ASHES!

Allow the ashes from your woodstove or fireplace to cool before emptying them into a metal container then cover with a tight fitting lid. Keep the container outside; do not store in a shed or garage, or on your porch even for a short time.

If you use portable space heaters make sure you keep them at least 3 feet away from combustibles (things that could burn) including books and paper, bedding, furniture, or curtains. Turn your heaters off before leaving your home or going to bed.

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Because we have an obligation to report incidents to the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office, all fires (structure or vegetation) within the townships of Head, Clara and Maria must be reported to the Municipal office or to our Community Fire Prevention Officer. ## WASTE COLLECTION REMINDERS

With a number of different people completing our waste collection over the past weeks it has become apparent that Municipal policy needs to be re-circulated and reinforced. The following are pertinent sections of the Environment Policy of the Municipality. Our employees have been advised to follow the guidelines of this policy. Should you have a situation which may constitute an exception – please contact the office; otherwise, the material will be left at the end of your drive or in your vehicle (if brought to the site).

1. The Municipality shall maintain and manage its disposal sites as per the “Site Development and Operations Plan” and the Ministry of the Environment (MOE) Certificate of Approval for each site.
2. Recycling initiatives will be encouraged and a program will be implemented being modified as more and more products are being accepted by Waste Diversion Ontario’s Stewardship programs.
3. A Household Hazardous Special Waste collection will be organized annually for use by our residents. (We are attempting to hold an event annually however; the response in 2009 did not warrant a 2010 event. There will likely be a collection in the fall of 2011.)

Because of the Ministry of the Environment rules the municipality is not authorized to hold Municipal Hazardous or Special Waste at our disposal sites, nor is this material to be landfilled. Instead, each homeowner is to store this material until they have an authorized venue for disposal. **This means that you are responsible to store your old paint, oil and oil containers, propane tanks, fertilizers, fluorescent lights and batteries – to name a few items – until our fall collection. Our attendant will be refusing these materials at the site.** For a more detailed list of hazardous materials, please check our website or contact the office.

Currently we are in the process of having a Waste Management Plan drafted through an outside firm, funded by the Continuous Improvement Fund (created by Stewardship Ontario, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and Waste Diversion Ontario) to encourage and increase recycling. Once this plan is created it will be presented to Council who will ultimately make decisions as to how best to increase our recycling and reduce the amount of materials that are going to landfill. Many different practises will be considered. Once Council’s decisions are made, they will be implemented, advertised and enforced. Please do your part and recycle. Watch for news in an upcoming newsletter or visit our website for additional information.

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**What can we do right now?** It has come to our attention that past practises have resulted in large amounts of recyclable materials ending up in the landfill. Please be patient while our new attendant makes the changes required to effectively implement Council’s current policies.

This may mean that you will have to further sort your material. Bill will be carefully checking the material going into the landfill and will be diverting those items that may be reused or recycled. Please be prepared and come to the site with your materials pre-sorted. Gone are the days when everything simply got dumped into the hole. Enforcing policies might also mean that you may have to wait in line while loads are being reviewed. Although perhaps inconvenient, these changes are necessary to ensure that our landfill serves us for many years to come. Waste management has gotten expensive; lets each do our part to keep our costs down.

## Guidelines for Roadside Collection

The municipality limits the roadside collection of waste to 2 standard sized garbage bags per household or establishment per week in order to keep disposal site costs down and to encourage recycling. (As our garbage and recycling is loaded and unloaded by hand it must be properly bagged. Loose material will not be collected. Any material left at the roadside is the property owner's responsibility.) Currently, material in excess of this amount may be dropped off at the disposal site. This too may change in the near future pending Council review of a draft Waste Management Plan.

The municipality shall arrange for the roadside collection of recyclable materials from residences in Mackey and Stonecliffe. The material from residences in Bissett Creek and Deux Rivieres will be collected by the disposal site attendant on the same days as garbage is collected. (Please see our website for additional details.)

Depots shall be placed at the disposal sites in Mackey, Bissett Creek and beside the Municipal garage in Stonecliffe for the placement of excess recyclable materials and the materials collected from Bissett Creek and Deux Rivieres.

No construction debris or discarded household furniture is to be picked up at any time; it must be brought to the disposal site by the resident.

All garbage must be in tied plastic bags or sealed cardboard boxes. Any garbage that is scattered about by birds or animals must be picked up by the owner of the garbage and is not the responsibility of the attendant. (Many people have created bins or use old freezers to hold their waste to avoid spread by animals or weather.)

Pick up will be from Highway 17 and municipal roads only. Persons residing on other roads shall take their garbage to the nearest landfill site or to the nearest pickup at a recognised point. This recognised point is often the snowplow turnaround for the municipal road or at the edge of Highway 17. This is also the point used for collection of recyclable materials. The disposal site attendant, while doing pick up, is authorized to refuse materials that are inappropriate to transport or are not accepted by our Certificates of Approval.

The disposal site attendant has the ultimate authority to determine if road or weather conditions should prevent collection on any given day. Should the attendant decide that collection shall not occur; he/she shall contact the Municipal office and advise them of this decision as soon as possible. Collection shall then take place on the next day that is not a Statutory holiday.

The attendant will allow a maximum of 4 - one-half ton truck loads of brush per household per year to be disposed of.

The burning of household garbage is an infraction and is subject to fines from the MOE. Burning of the garbage at the disposal sites will not be allowed at any time. Anyone caught setting fire to the garbage will be reported to the MOE. If an employee, their employment will be terminated.

## Municipal Hazardous and Special Waste (MHSW) or (HHW)

The following materials are considered Hazardous Waste and are not allowed to be disposed of in landfill. In order to provide an opportunity for disposal for our residents, Council has sponsored a HHW collection event in the past and will continue to do so. The date is to be confirmed but will be in the fall and well advertised. Please watch for notices at post offices, our webpage and the Township office.

As there are costs involved with this collection, based on the volume of materials collected, HHW disposal is only available to residents and for materials that originated within the municipality. A staff member will be on site with the contractor to ensure that only residents make use of this service.

The materials to be collected will include: Paints and stains and their containers; Solvent such as thinners for paint, lacquer and contact cement, paint strippers and degreasers, and their containers; Used oil filters; Oil containers of 30 litres or less for a wide range of oil products such as engine and marine oils, and hydraulic, power steering and transmission flu-

ids; Single use, dry cell batteries such as alkaline-manganese, zinc-carbon, lithium and button cell batteries (non-rechargeable ) Automotive antifreeze (engine coolant and related containers; Pressurized containers such as propane tanks and cylinders; Fertilizers, for example, plant food or plant nutrients containing nitrogen, phosphorous, potassium (N-P-K); Fungicides, herbicides, insecticides and pesticides and their containers; Aerosols; Acids; Cleaners; Fluorescents; and gasoline.

The following materials will not be collected: explosives and munitions, radioactive waste, pathological wastes, containers over 22 L and commercial wastes.

There will also be no transferring of waste out of containers— so expect that the container that you transport the materials in will be disposed of as well. **Please watch for posters with additional information closer to MHSW Collection day.**

# Hall & Roads News

## Hall Water

After some years, the water in the hall is now safe for human consumption. Using Federal Gas Tax funds, in 2010 we installed a new well, water softening system, iron filter and a UV filter, all as per a directive from the Board of Health enforcing Ontario's Safe Drinking Water legislation. After more than 4 consecutive CLEAN water samples, we are clear to begin drinking the water in the municipal hall. Although the water does taste a little salty, I have been assured that the levels pose no health risk, even to those who must follow a low sodium diet.

Water from the tap may be used to make coffee and for cooking. We will no longer be providing bottled water. For those looking for a glass of cold water, an additional osmosis filter has been added to the back sink in the kitchen – the small tap on the side. This tank however is quite small, approximately 1.5 gallons, and does not fill quickly. Please do not use for coffee. That is not its purpose; the system cannot operate quickly enough to refill the storage container in a short time.

## Parking

Please note that due to accessibility requirements there are now three designated "Accessible" parking spots ONE outside each of the three main doors. Please respect these spaces for people with mobility challenges. Each of the spaces is marked.

## Hall Use

We have amended our equipment borrowing policy slightly due to damage to chairs. Council has reviewed the policy and is now charging a flat fee – based on the number of chairs that are borrowed. The fee is minimal - \$50 for all 90 chairs, but needs to be charged to pay for chair replacement.

## Reminders from our Road Super

As per the *Highway Traffic Act*, 1990, Section 181, No person shall deposit snow or ice on a roadway without permission in writing to do so from the Ministry or the road authority responsible for the maintenance of the road. Please be cautious while clearing snow from your drive or lane and do not leave it on the road.

Additionally, be cautious while parking in snow plow turnarounds at the end of most of our municipal roads. Parked cars and trailers cause the plow to leave windrows of snow alongside vehicles which become obstructions once the vehicles are moved and the material is frozen. We are doing our best to keep our roads safe for everyone. Please do your part. Charges may be laid through the Ontario Provincial Police and the Highway Traffic Act.

Also, to prevent the costs of excessive repairs to our roads, the Municipality will implement Half

Load Restrictions on Mackey Creek, Kenny & Ashport Roads and Dunlop Crescent. Signs will be posted when this period begins and removed when the reduced load period ends. Thank you for your considera-

**PLASTIC BAGS** - All bags except chip and cereal bags;

**ALUMINUM FOIL & PLATES;**

**METAL & ALUMINUM CANS;**

**CARDBOARD** - All types of boxes and box-board broken down and flattened;

**MILK AND JUICE BOXES/CARTONS;**

**ALL PLASTIC CONTAINERS** Ketchup-mustard margarine/yogurt tubs etc.;

**PLASTIC BOTTLES;**

**STYROFOAM;**

**PAPER PRODUCTS** - Newspapers, Egg Cartons, Magazines, Catalogues, Telephone Books, Office Paper, Household Junk Mail, Envelopes;

**BROWN PAPER** - potato bags, flour bags, sugar bags;

**GLASS CONTAINERS, BOTTLES, JARS** Put Any Broken Glass in a Separate, Sealed Container to Prevent Injuries.

**SMALL APPLIANCES.**

Our contractors request that all materials be cleaned and placed in clear (transparent) plastic bags for collection to prevent material from absorbing water from weather, making recyclables more difficult to collect and process.

There are a few simple rules to ensure that the materials collected end up recycled and not in our landfill. All containers must be rinsed so that no food particles remain in or on the container or bag. It's not necessary to remove paper from cans however; it is advisable to push the lids inside cans to prevent injuries during handling.

Separate paper from material that has been washed. Unclean and damaged (wet) material will end up in our landfill.

Cottagers/Visitors - please make your best efforts to join in our program. You may be able to place your recyclables out along with full time residents at designated locations or, you may place them in bins located beside the Township garage in Stonecliffe or at the Stonecliffe Disposal Site. ## 2010 Recycling and Garbage Statistics

2010 was the fourth year of our municipal recycling program and volume is down. 2009 numbers show a decrease in the amount of material recycled and an increase in costs.

### Stewardship Ontario funding received based on the yearly volume and costs of Blue Box Program

**2009 for 2007—\$7,939**

**2010 for 2008—\$7,104**

**2011 for 2009—\$4,678**

Although our stats are not compiled for 2010 we do know that there is still a significant amount of material being

diverted. The challenge is that there is also significant material going into the landfill.

### Municipal Hazardous and Special Waste

There was poor attendance at the 2009 fall Municipal Hazardous and Special Waste Collection (MHSW) with only 6 people coming out and as a result we did not host an event in 2010.

We did receive many phone calls about what to do with this type of material during the fall. The answer is... **do not landfill it but instead store it for our MHSW collection in the fall.**

Although we are confident that the amount of material being diverted is significant residents and visitors both need to continue to take steps to reduce the amount of waste going to the landfill sites.

## Tax Notices

Tax Notices will be mailed early March. Due date for this interim bill is March 31, 2011. Options for payment are in person at the Township Office by cash or cheque or via regular mail.

We would like to remind you that you now have the opportunity to pay your taxes through an Electronic Funds Transfer at any Ontario branch of Scotiabank.

You need to ensure that you have your tax bill with you. Although we do not have the volume to warrant the cost of accepting credit cards or interac at the office, we are attempting to find alternate cost-effective ways for you to pay your bills.

### How Your Interim Bill is calculated?

The interim bill (usually due the last day of March) is based on an estimate. It is 50% of your previous year's tax bill. The tax rates and instalment due dates for 2011 have not yet been set. Past dates have been the end of June and September and will likely be retained if possible.
