MONTHLY HEALTH CHECK & WELL- NESS CLINICS

BOOK REVIEWS

Take advantage of your local library...



Ru by Kim Thuy, translated by Sheila Fischman, is a well deserved Governor General's Literary Award for Fiction winner. Thuy's writing is fluid and evocative, describing the transition from war-torn Vietnam to a new beginning in Quebec. Experiences of isolation, brutality, compassion, fear and beauty are expressed as a tapestry in her recollections of past and present. This book of fiction is a gem and a slim read.

Another great summer read for those of us (most of us) over fifty: *I Feel Great About My Hands and Other Unexpected Joys of Aging*, edited by Shari Graydon. Forty-one women reflect on the inevitable process of aging from many perspectives, sharing their struggles and their joys with humour and perceptiveness. Mary Walsh (comic, actor, activist), Lynn Miles (singer), Elizabeth May (politician and activist), and Alison Smith (CBC journalist) are just a few of the contributors to this entertaining and thoughtful collection. Proceeds benefit Medi-aAction, an organization which challenges the stereotyping and underrepresentation of women in media.

MEET & GREET

Wanda and Richard Baril!

Wanda and Richard moved to Deux Rivieres from North Bay about 11 years ago, making Yvon Duchene's home theirs. Richard first came to the area with a few friends from southern Ontario to the Little Beaver Hunt Camp, and eventually became co-owner of what became Judy and Omer Beaulieu's home, just east of Brent Road.

When he and Wanda met, they often stayed at Coleen Carrier's Bed and Breakfast for fishing and hunting excursions. They loved the area and knew that this was the place they wanted to be. The pines, rock and water were deeply familiar and Home.

On a visit to Deux Rivieres with Wanda's parents, both couples found themselves inquiring about properties for sale. Wanda's parents actually bought first - same day, but first!... Wanda's mum now lives in Las Vegas, but when they travelled there with the intention of spending most of the winter in the warmer and dryer climes, they missed the haunting northern landscape and with a sense of relief returned to our crisp clear cold.

When Richard retired from Union Gas after 35 years, they moved in. Richard says that from the first day he arrived, he wanted to be out with the chain saw and work-

ing his own land. He checked with Yvon to make sure he was OK with cutting the big tree which obscured his view of the river, and the tree was soon down. The land and the river set deep in his bones.

Wanda was raised in the Oshawa/Cobourg area where she and her family spent some time on the lake and in the bush; she wasn't all city-slicker. She moved to Toronto and eventually knew that she had to get out. After reading an ad for a log house on 30 acres in Sundridge, she, as a single mom with her 4 year-old son, went to check it out. It was love at first sight. They moved into the house complete with tractor, and tried hobby farming. Wanda learned how to heat with a wood stove, raise animals, sell eggs, and put down garden produce, and although the learning curve was high, they both thrived in that environment. The need for a job eventually became a priority, and, in a couple of years, they moved to North Bay where Wanda worked as a personal care worker for Castle Home Seniors' Residence, as well as in private home care. She presently works part-time for the Algonquin Nursing Home in Mattawa, and volunteers part-time in palliative care. Wanda's 3 children have gifted her with 3 grandchildren, with another on the way. They all live in the Vancouver area, soon, hopefully to be joined by Richard's son who is presently working his way around the world on cruise ships.

When Wanda and Richard met through a mutual friend, they felt a deep connection for each other right away. Wanda was drawn to Richard's gentle quiet nature, and Richard to someone with whom he could share his love

for the outdoors. Theirs is a relationship that continues to grow, discovering new aspects of themselves as they forge their lives together in a lifestyle that challenges and nurtures.

Kay Sarrazin and family quickly adopted them into their family and are responsible, too, for introducing them to karaoke which they both enjoy. They love to hear stories of the history of the area, and Charlie Campbell has provided much lore. As Richard says, they always seem to be preparing for winter – searching, cutting, stacking wood, and enjoy every minute of it. Feeding and watching the birds, fishing, gardening, playing euchre and visiting with good friends all provide the sustenance they need to live rich lives in this, God`s Country.

And enrich our community they do. A course they took when in North Bay had an incredible impact on their decision to live a value-conscious life style. They do not believe in `religion` per se, but both consciously choose to live life according to basic Christian principles. At a candlelight Christmas Eve service at the Anglican Church in Deux Rivieres, they invited anyone who was interested to share with them in this discussion-based course, and thus began a close relationship with Carl and Laurel Lentz. Both couples attend the Mattawa Christian Fellowship Church, a community guided by an emphasis on people, rather than religious dogma.

Richard shares with us some of his guiding principles: live and let live; accept people for who they are; rule by example rather than by

tongue; do unto others as you would have them do unto you

and go fishing.



DEEP RIVER AND DISTRICT COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

The DRDCF is a public charitable organization that distributes grants to charities, municipalities and educational institutions. The Foundation has, so far, \$600,000 in endowment Funds which are invested long term.

The earnings on this money is disbursed annually. In 10 years, the Foundation has disbursed \$80,000 in a variety of different areas.

The foundation serves the whole area from Deux Rivieres to Chalk River, including Swisha. Many people have donated money to the Foundation to accumulate the \$600,000 and we have recently launched a campaign to get to \$1,000,000. This will allow the foundation to award more grant money into the broad community to serve local needs now and into the future.

WASTE MANAGEMENT

Beginning May 1, 2012 a user pay or “pay as you throw” system was implemented. The general components of this system include:

- ◆ Tipping fees for all users for all garbage aside from one **FREE** bag per residence per week and four **FREE** bags per business per week;
- ◆ A prorated number of bag tags will be provided for cottagers/seasonal residents;
- ◆ **FREE** recycling—for all users, all recyclables and any volume;
- ◆ For introduction—5 extra **FREE** bags of waste for the remainder of 2012;
- ◆ Compensation of up to 75% of the cost of a composter to a maximum of \$50 per container or material required to build a composter. Bring your receipt in to the municipal office to receive a refund. Initially the program will only be available to permanent year round residents of HCM.
- ◆ Those with cottages may receive compensation under certain considerations. Please see municipal office staff for details.
- ◆ Only tagged bags of garbage will be collected road side—one per residence, four per business. Any further waste will have to be self hauled to the disposal sites.



- ◆ Any number of recyclable materials will be collected road side for **FREE** or recyclables may be dropped off at the disposal sites.

WHY PAY AS YOU THROW?

This program has been implemented to enforce the principle of “generator pays”. The less waste you produce, the less you pay. The ultimate goal is to extend the life of our landfill sites by encouraging waste diversion through the use of various **FREE** municipal programs.

BAG TAGS

Bag Tags have been ordered and delivered to the municipal office. Staff will soon be in a position to mail out tags to full time residents and cottage/seasonal property owners. Due to the size of the tags, residents who are able can save the municipality some money by picking their tags up at the office.

Land owners, without camps/trailers etc. will not be mailed tags. Nor will all those with MNR Land Use Permits as we are not privy to your mailing addresses. Allowances will be made for these individuals as the season goes by. By the next mail out, hopefully all exceptions and challenges will be worked out and we will mail the required number of tags to you or have you pick them up at the municipal office.

Don't worry, if for some reason, you are late receiving your tags, exceptions will be made for the first few weeks, full implementation and penalties will not begin until July 1, 2012 however; tipping fees at the landfill sites and collection limits are now in effect.

MUNICIPAL HAZARDOUS WASTE

Due to the costs of amending our Certificate of Approval for storage at the Stonecliffe Disposal Site, Council has withdrawn its application. What this means is that each individual is responsible for storing their own hazardous material until the next scheduled collection day. **The date is set for Saturday, June 2, 2012. The collection will take place at the Stonecliffe/Kenny Road landfill site from 10:00 to 1:00. Please mark this date and bring all of your hazardous materials to dispose at this time.**

Upon withdrawing our application, we were reminded by the Ministry of the Environment that we have an obligation to perform spot checks to ensure that no hazardous materials are being deposited into our site. This means that at any time, Bill may mark a bag col-

lected at your drive and/or dropped at the site by you to determine whether recyclables or hazardous materials are contained inside.

Materials that should not be landfilled but instead saved for the Municipal Hazardous Waste Day include: **antifreeze, lighter fluid, Lye, batteries**

Brake fluid, Mothballs, Chemical strippers

Nail polish remover, Chlorine bleach

Propane tanks, Contact cement, Paints

Pesticides, Drain cleaners, Pool chemicals

Fire extinguishers, Prescription drugs

Flea collars and sprays, Solvents

Herbicides, Insect repellent, Spot removers

Insecticides, Stains and finishes, Kerosene

Toilet cleaners, Lawn chemicals

The Council of the United Townships of Head, Clara & Maria have recently adopted a newly amended Procedure By-law. The new by-law includes changes to the method and rules surrounding addressing council through deputations. Please review the entire document on line at <http://www.townshipsofheadclaramaria.ca/By-laws> under the 2012 by-laws tab. There are also written rules for public meetings. For your information... **14.0 PUBLIC MEETINGS**

14.1. Public meetings required to be held under municipal by-laws or provincial or federal legislation may be held from time to time.

14.2. If other legislated rules or procedures apply to those meetings, those procedures shall be followed. In the absence of other defined rules or procedures, public meetings will be chaired by the Presiding Officer who will hear from each member of the public who wishes to speak.

14.3. Rules of decorum as they relate to deputations and civil procedure as listed elsewhere in this by-law shall be followed by all those speaking at a public meeting.

14.4. Each person will be allowed no more than 5 minutes to speak at a time.

14.5. Following public input, Councillors may ask questions of the public presenters or staff but the topic shall not be debated until after all public input and questions have been received.
