Since our last newsletter, we've had a number of events including New Year's Eve, the Missing Link Snowmobile Club poker run and Trail Side Café, Saturdays in February. Thanks for coming out.

Anyone who has been to the community centre over the past 3 months would have noticed significant changes to the office. Following council direction, staff have worked together with a contractor and designer to come up with a workspace that better fits our current needs. Over the past 10 years or more, the workload continues to accumulate with the province constantly downloading responsibilities onto municipal staff.

Every aspect of this administration has become more involved with more legislated requirements, forms, surveys and reports to complete. Annually records are to be created, updated, submitted and archived for areas from road maintenance, road condition and temperature to accessibility, freedom of information requests and energy plans. In addition, instead of transferring funding on an all-purpose basis allowing municipalities to make their own spending decisions, both the provincial and federal governments are making funding conditional on applications and reports; even for the "guaranteed" funding. All of this takes time to complete which in turn requires additional staff members.

The requirement for storage of all of those documents further adds to our space challenges. The storage cupboards created during the hall renovation have quickly filled with documents we are leg-islated to keep. Staff have been working to purge those items, and that too takes time.

The spring thaw will see the second stage of our planned construction with an addition being built to the east of the current offices to help meet our space challenges. A new entrance-way has been created and will be further modified to create a professional entrance worthy of a municipal town hall. It is anticipated that all of these changes will occur, through the use of reserves dedicated to this purpose, borrowing of internal reserves and the use of Gas Tax funds with little or no effect on our municipal budget.

Come summer we should have a municipal facility to be proud of.

The second significant project for 2017 will be Head, Clara & Maria's celebration of Ontario and Canada's 150th birthday with HCMHomecoming2017! Plans are well under way and exciting events have been scheduled leading up to and over the Canada Day long weekend geared to all ages, and all interests. Plan to participate from Friday, June 30 to and including Monday, July 3, 2017, with special events scheduled for Father's Day Weekend. And there's more to come.

We are planning activities, on land, on the water, in Stonecliffe, in Mackey, indoors and out. Some activities will occur prior to the weekend to allow time for organization and/or judging; so have your kids and grandkids watch for essay and poster contest notices. There's also an all ages photo contest.

If you have any suggestions to add to the special celebration, please contact your member of Coun-

cil, office staff or Recreation Committee members. We are looking for volunteers for a large number of areas and appreciate any willingness to help out.

A MESSAGE FROM MAYOR GIBSON

Hello all,

This year marked a change in ROMA (Rural Ontario Municipal Association). For the last 16 years, ROMA has co hosted their annual convention with the Ontario Good Roads Association (OGRA). This year Roma decided to host their annual convention separate from OGRA.

The organizers had hoped to get 600 to 800 delegates attending and were pleasantly surprised when 1050 delegates registered for the convention. I had never attended any of these conferences because I wasn't sure of the benefits to our municipality. However, with Roma's increased attention to small rural Ontario municipalities, I decided to attend this year's convention and am I ever glad I did. Roma has the Province divided into nine zones and each zone representative serves on the Roma Board of Directors. In our zone, zone six, a vacancy occurred with the resignation of Jim Sheedy from Petawawa. An election to fill the vacancy was conducted at the convention. I ran against two other delegates and was not successful. The results of the election were Bresee 25, Gibson 16, and Feurth two. The convention was an excellent learning opportunity for me and a chance to network with some very experienced and influential people. Keynote speakers, Doug Griffiths, author of the book <u>13 WAYS TO KILL YOUR COMMUNITY</u>, and CBC's Rex Murphy, host of CROSS-COUNTRY CHECKUP, were very inspirational.

The convention serves as an opportunity for rural municipal politicians and staff to meet with Provincial cabinet ministers and their senior staff. These meetings are prearranged and are usually very short, about 10 to 15 minutes in duration, and are going on all the time during the convention. The Rural Mayors Forum of Eastern Ontario (RMFEO) arranged a delegation to speak about policing costs. This delegation resulted in a follow-up meeting with senior OPP staff the next day and I was able to attend that meeting.

The Premier and 20 of her 26 ministers were on stage for an hour to answer questions from the convention delegates. Believe it or not, I was impressed with a few of the ministers.

It was a very busy three days and I look forward to next year's convention.

Last year Head Clara and Maria joined a group called the Rural Mayors Forum of Eastern Ontario (RMFEO). This group is comprised of 14 mayors from five different counties and meets on the first Friday of every month. At January's meeting, the representative from Tay Valley brought to our attention a proposed change in the building code. This proposed change would have slipped under our radar and was news to most of the other members of the Rural Mayors Forum. The proposed changes are underlined.

8.9.3.4. Class 4 Sewage Systems

(1) *Septic tanks* and other *treatment units* shall be cleaned whenever sludge and scum occupy one-third of the *working capacity* of the tank <u>or every within five years of the last pump out, whichever occurs first</u>.

(2) <u>The records of *septic tanks* and *treatment units* cleaning as required by Sentences (1) shall be kept by the operator of the *sewage system* for submission to the *chief building official* upon request.</u>

These proposed amendments to the Building Code are so wrong for so many reasons that I had no choice but to lobby to have them withdrawn.

I wrote a letter to the Minister on January 27 and as result of that letter, on February 14th, Councillor Grills, your alternate Head of Council, and I had a one hour conference call with six staff from the Ministry of Municipal Affairs. We attempted to get them to withdraw these proposed changes to no avail.

I have appeared as a delegation to Council meetings at Whitewater Region (Cobden) and at Laurentian Hills asking those municipalities and their Mayors to write their own resolutions and letters to the Minister objecting to these proposed changes. Your own council, at its meeting on February 17th, approved a resolution and endorsed another letter from me to the Minister. At the County Council meeting on February 22, I asked the County Council support the lower tier municipalities in their efforts to have these changes withdrawn. County staff are in the process of writing the documentation for approval at the March 29 County Council meeting.

I will continue lobbying against these changes and will seek support wherever I can get it. One of the most effective ways for a resident to help us is to write a letter to the Minister. If you decide to help out you can contact any municipal staff or me for background information that is too lengthy to publish in this newsletter. Your assistance would be greatly appreciated by Council and staff.

We will keep you informed of our progress.

FIRE SAFETY

Before we know it, Spring will be here. Below are some safety tips from the Office of the Fire Marshal and Emergency Management; things to keep in mind when spring cleaning.

In the house:

- Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, change batteries immediately if needed.
- Check your fire extinguishers.
- Check for overloaded or damaged extension cords, replace where needed.
- Ensure you have an emergency preparedness kit in case of incidents such as power outages and flooding.
- Practice your families fire escape plan so everyone knows what to do in case of an emergency.
- Windows should be checked to ensure they open and close properly, in case they are needed as an exit.
- Properly store household chemicals and never mix cleaning agents.
- Recycle: Get rid of old newspapers, magazines and junk mail. These items tend to pile up and can greatly contribute to the severity and spread of fire.
- Check and clean filters above stove.
- Pull refrigerator out and vacuum or dust the coils.
- Always keep stairs and landings clear for safe evacuation in event of an emergency.

Around the house:

- Make sure your address numbers are up and visible from the street.
- Maintain a clear 'fire zone' of 10' around structures.
- Check outdoor electrical outlets and other electrical appliances for animal nests and to ensure proper wiring
- Keep 100' of garden hose with an attached nozzle connected and ready for use.
- Remove leaves and trash from carports and garages: Combustible materials are dangerous if they are exposed to heated automobile components, especially under the vehicle.
- Clean up and properly store paints, pool and yard chemicals.
- Check fuels containers for leaks and make sure they are properly stored.
- Let power equipment sit for approximately 30 minutes before placing it inside to be sure there is no possibility of fire.

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Mark your calendars!!! On October 18th, there is a live musical drama coming to the Stonecliffe Township Hall. The name of this production is "Stonecliff"!

Read on for a brief description of the play.

"A new musical drama about the man who built the White Pass and Yukon Railway

Book by Conrad Boyce , Music by Matthew Lien

Canada's 150th birthday is an opportunity to celebrate some of our nation's untold stories. One of them concerns a second-generation Irishman, born on a farm in the upper Ottawa Valley, who became one of the greatest railway builders in North America.



Michael J. Heney, born in 1864, was working on the CPR hundreds of miles from home when he was still a teenager. He supervised the construction of his first railway in Washington State when he was only 24. When gold was discovered in the Klondike, Heney was ready. He convinced some English financiers that he was the man to build a railway over the mountains from Skagway into the Yukon, to service one of the richest goldfields in the world. The last spike on the White Pass and Yukon Route was driven on July 29, 1900, and today the WPYR is recognized as one of the great engineering

marvels of the world, on par with the Panama Canal. "Big Mike" Heney became known as Alaska's "Irish Prince", and was working on another "impossible" railway along the Copper River when he died as a result of a shipwreck off the B.C. coast. He was only 45. Heney's story is intrinsically theatrical: a larger-than-life hero, achievements against the odds, beating the bad guys, tragic death. And now it will be told in a grand piece of musical theatre to be co-produced in the Yukon/Alaska and Ottawa Valley in the fall of 2017. The score will be played on traditional Irish folk instruments, but incorporating the ragtime and "tin pan alley" styles so intrinsic to the time and place of the WPYR's construction.

Taking the helm of "STONECLIFF" are two artists well known in the Yukon for their creative energy and innovative approach to story-telling. CONRAD BOYCE is an actor, director, producer and playwright, currently residing in the Ottawa Valley, with an established reputation for vibrant history-based theatre in both the Yukon and Ontario. MATTHEW LIEN is an internationally recognized musician and composer, passionate about the environment and cultural history, and a master of the variety of styles, epic and intimate, required to tell this story.

STONECLIFF will tour a number of Ontario towns in the fall of 2017, as well as Whitehorse and the two Alaska communities that know "Big Mike" well: Skagway and Cordova. Our team, which includes one of Heney's own great-nephews, looks forward to your participation in this great theatrical adventure."

Volunteers will pick up the returns at the drop off points twice a week. Individuals will be called when their completed return is ready for them to pick up at the drop off point. If you should need to speak with a volunteer please call Glen at the number below to make an appointment.

The Program runs for 6 weeks from March 6 to April 13. There will be no free assistance after April 13. Anyone wishing assistance should get their information in early to take advantage of this free service.
